- 3. Do I feel I can reach my goals with this company?
- 4. Do co-workers share the same sense of enthusiasm I do for the product?
- 5. Does the product assist individuals on their path?
- 6. Does the work offer the level of creativity I desire?
- 7. Do the company beliefs align with my faith or beliefs?
- 8. Are the employees allowed a level of freedom to explore ideas or methods?
- 9. Does the work allow employees to be innovative with continuing success?
- 10. Does the career offer a comfortable level of physical activity for your body?

A company with the benefit of a paid education could be a night class to keep you updated on what is new in the industry, how to use a new piece of equipment or a new computer program for an upgrade to the company's new system. It may also be an education for a degree in the same field, offering a degree for you and a potential future with the company in a higher paid position. One of my seniors talked with his employer after a class discussion on this topic. Although not the norm, the employer agreed to pay for the student's college education if he worked part-time during college and agreed to work two years for the employer after graduation, all with pay.

Many fields expect you to have a degree and pay for the courses needed to keep your license or credentials updated and active. Examples of this would be a teacher, nurse, real estate agent, massage therapist, acupuncturists, etc.
